Copenhagen, Denmark

The capital of Denmark, Copenhagen is a city full of modernity and natural style with a laid back ambiance. Visitors will find the city extremely easy to traverse due to excellent urban planning. History buffs will also enjoy exploring the many museums and castles. It is also the birthplace of Hans Christian Andersen, the famous author of the Little Mermaid and other tales. The city is a charming place that mixes old and new together with a little something that everyone can enjoy.

THINGS TO DO

Iconic Neighborhoods

- **City Center-** A great place to meander through the streets. Visitors can go shopping, tour museums, and walk through several palaces. This is the cultural heart of the city.
- **Meatpacking District-** This part of the city has enjoyed a recent revitalization with a growing creative scene and a trendy bent. Go here for great nightlife and top tier restaurants with a wide range of options that foodies will enjoy.

Activities

- **Visit Amalienborg Palace,** the residence of the Queen of Denmark in the city and also the home of the Amalienborg Museum. Four buildings are situated around a square, and only Christian VIII's palace is open to the public. Take a journey through 150 years of history with a tour through each of the rooms of the palace set up just the way previous rulers left them. Also see crown jewels, rococo architecture, and a large art collection.
- **Enjoy a fun night out on the town in Blågårdsgade.** Around Blågårds Square and down Blågårdsgade Street are lots of stylish bars and nightclubs, venues for live music, vegetarian cafes, wine bars, and more. Visitors can find every kind of restaurant serving up a diverse choice of cuisine for every kind of taste. Don't forget to sample the extremely popular craft beer.

Family Friendly

- **The whole family will enjoy the excitement and thrills of Tivoli Gardens,** an inner city theme park. It is the second oldest theme park in the world and attracts visitors of all ages with rides, attractions, and cultural performances. Kids will especially love the marching and music of the Tivoli Boy's Guard- the children's counterpart to the Queen's Royal Guards. The brave can hop onto any number of roller coasters. Couples can also enjoy a romantic setting in the evenings with lamps hanging from trees and cafes for coffee and dessert.

Tallin, Estonia

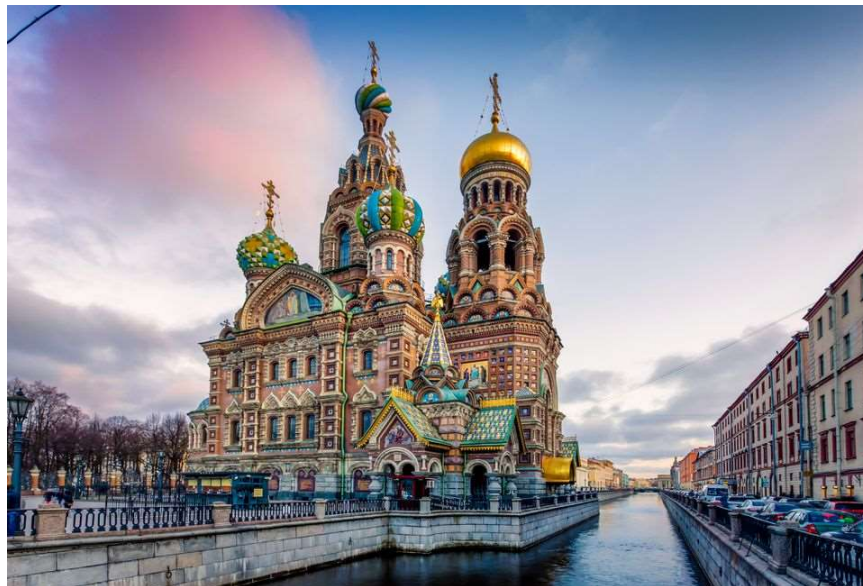
- Tallin is a main port in the country of Estonia, and is also the capital. It is located in the Baltic Sea on the north coast. Tallin used to be called Reval in 1918 but once it became independent in 1920 it was changed to Tallinn. The port itself handles cargo and passenger ships. The port has four harbors which is Old City, Muuga, Paljassaare, and South Harbor.
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THINGS TO DO

- The Old Town is a great place to visit when you are in Tallinn. Tourist from all over come here every year to view the historic city. Dated back from the 11th century, the town consist of cobbled streets, fortresses, and cathedrals. The city is divided into two parts, one being called Toompea Hill which was mainly a residential neighborhood, and the other called the Lower Town. Great photo opportunities on every street corner.

If you want to see polar bears and Siberian Tigers, the Tallinn Zoo is the place to go. They also have crocodiles and chimpanzees. Plenty of cold weather animals for your enjoyment. Petting zoos for those who want to encounter up close animals. This is a great stop for the whole family.

St Petersburg, Russia



Saint Petersburg is a city located in northwestern Russia on the delta of the river Neva. The city has a population of about 4.8 million and is considered Russia's second largest city. This is also the most important Russian port on the Baltic. Founded by Tsar Peter the Great in the year 1703 as a "window to Europe," it served as the capital of the Russian Empire for over two hundred years.

THINGS TO DO

The Summer House was designed by Domenico Trezzini in the Baroque style for Tsar Peter the Great. One of the oldest structures in the city, this masonry palace is surprisingly modest by Russian Imperial standards and contains just 14 main rooms. The mansion was designed as an entertainment center and was used for warm weather. Peter moved into the partially

completed palace in 1712 and spent most of his summers here until he died in 1725. He occupied the lower level and his wife preferred the upper rooms. The palace is now a museum and both the house and the adjacent Summer Garden are open to the public.

Located between the bank of the Neva River and the Palace Square, is the Winter Palace in St. Petersburg, which was built between 1754 and 1762. Designed by Bartolomeo Rastrelli, the Baroque-style, green-and-white palace has about 1,786 doors and 1,945 windows. Catherine the Great was its first royal occupant in the palace. The palace is now part of a group of magnificent buildings that is called the State Hermitage Museum which holds one of the world's greatest collections of art. As part of the Museum, many of the Winter Palace's 1,057 halls and rooms are open to the public for viewing

Helsinki, Finland

Helsinki, Helsingfors in Swedish, is the capital of Finland. The estimated population of Helsinki is about 550,000. Founded in 1550 as a rival to the Hanseatic city of Reval by King Gustav I of Sweden, the town of Helsingfors struggled in its early years. The settlement was plagued by poverty, wars, and diseases. For a long time it stayed as a small low-key coastal town. To help reduce the Swedish impact, Tsar Alexander I of Russia had the capital moved from Turku to Helsingfors. This move strengthened the city's new role and the following decades saw record growth and development for the city, creating the rudiments for the origin of a modern world class capital in the 20th century. Although most of the first half of the 20th century was a violent time for Helsinki, it continued to gradually develop. Modern postwar urbanization of the 1970s, which occurred late in the European context, tripled the population in the metropolitan area, making the Helsinki metropolitan area one of the fastest growing urban centers in Europe in the 1990s.

THINGS TO DO

In Helsinki you must visit the Iso Vasikkasaari. It is an island that you will want to spend the day on. This is a magnificent place for picnics and a relaxing time. There are two beaches and you will just love the time you spend enjoying everything on this beautiful island. Right near the beach is the Hietaniemen Hautausmaa. The Hietaniemen Hautausmaa is a cemetery that is quite a sight to see. Spend an interesting afternoon looking at all the different gravestones that are separated into four different religious segments.

Or enjoy the Vuosaaren Urheilutalo. It has a free swimming and sauna. When you get one of the treatments at this fantastic health center that has a swimming pool and a solarium too you will never want to leave. Take some time to pamper yourself at this exceptional place.

Visby, Sweden



Visby is the largest city on the Swedish island of Gotland with a population of about 23,000, and is the best-preserved medieval town in Scandinavia. Visby has also become a UNESCO World Heritage Site. Of its history, the most notable objects are the two and a half mile long stone wall called "Ringmuren" that encircles the city, and the old church ruins. The name "Visby" comes from the Old Norse Vi, meaning sacrificial place.

THINGS TO DO

The Visby port is also another place with a lot of night life. The port is always crowded in the summer months. People and boats wherever you look. There is always something happening here at the ports such as parties, performances, or just people gathering to have a good time.

Riga, Latvia



One of the three main ports in Latvia is Riga. The other two are Ventspils and Lepaja. A vast majority of transits go through these ports. Latvia is the main route through the Baltic Sea for transit trade. There are also small ports in Latvia that handle smaller ships, fishing, and wood products. Riga is located on a 10 mile stretch along the Daugava River.

THINGS TO DO

When you are in Riga, be sure to check out Dome Cathedral, which is considered to be the largest church in the Baltic States. Dome Cathedral was built in the 13th century and has gone through many renovations. This church contains an organ that is dated back to 1844.

The Riga Castle houses the Museum of Foreign Art and Museum of Latvian History. The castle was founded in 1330 and has a wooded architecture. Upon seizure of the Swedes, Annexes were constructed in 1641.

Stockholm, Sweden



Stockholm, Sweden is the largest city in Scandinavia and takes up space on 14 islands. Established in 1252, it grew into a popular port for cruises to Northern Europe. It mixes together its modern history with its medieval one- both preserving the old and embracing the new. Stockholm is constantly evolving and is Europe's cultural capital with a sense of style, as well as the first Green capital. Everyone can find something to enjoy here, be it history, new trends in food and culture, and great shopping.

THINGS TO DO

Iconic Neighborhoods

- Gamla Stan- Painstakingly preserved, this literally means “Old Town” and is one of the largest collections of 16th century houses in Europe. Wander through the enchanting medieval streets and see the vividly painted houses that you would more regularly find in the Mediterranean.
- SoFo/Nytorget- South of Folkungagatan, travelers can find unique coffee shops, vintage shops, and a kitsch flair everywhere. It's also a haven for artists and designers. Don't miss the Nytorget Urban Deli- a giant supermarket, deli, bistro, bar, and bakery complex all in one.

Activities

- Visit the Kungliga Slottet (Royal Palace) in Gamla Stan. It is one of the Europe's largest castles and the official residence of the king. Built in the 13th century, it has over 600 rooms and 11 floors. This is also the home of a number of attractions like the Treasury of the National Government, the medieval history Tre Kronor Museum, the Representation floors, Gustav III's antique museum and castle church.
- Oldest of its kind, take a tour of the Skansen Open-Air Museum. It is the country in miniature, with houses and farmsteads from all over Sweden. It is also a zoo with native animals. Walk through time on a historical route to see old 18th century mansions, farms, and more while meeting those dressed in period costume.

Family Friendly

- Head to the contemporary modern art museum, Moderna Museet. Here visitors can download the audio guide for a tour through the museum with the whole family. Specially designed for kids, it takes them through the story of different pieces of art as they walk through. There are also kids activities as they tour, with puzzles, fun tasks and more.
- Do not miss the Vasa Museet. Built to house the salvaged 17th century ship in its entirety, the museum tells the story of the ship and those who built it. Kids can engage in digital and hands on learning activities and they will love the models and interactive exhibits
